Duties:

- Responsible for the total administration of the unit as well as the planning, development, and implementation of individual programs tailored to meet the particular needs of inmates in the housing unit.
- Responsible for the overall supervision of offenders at the following security-level facilities: -Administrative: Housing of Pre-Trial, Pre-Sentence, and Hold-Over offenders.
- -Medium: Offenders requiring a degree of supervision based on the seriousness of their crime, violence, protection of victims/witnesses, and the general public. These offenders are housed in facilities with increased security measures. Also, I was responsible for the supervision of a Care Level 3 mental health unit. These offenders have complex and chronic mental health conditions requiring frequent clinical contact to maintain control or stability of their condition.

- Provided training to all staff annually in inmate reentry, self-defense tactics, and interpersonal communication skills.
- Responsible for supervising staff: case managers, correctional counselors, unit secretaries, correctional officers, clinical psychologists, and education specialists.
- Responsible for the quality control of all progress reports, transfer recommendations, and correspondence, such as release plans, congressional inquiries, and tort claims. Communicated with probation officers, attorneys, judges, and other law enforcement community members.

- Responsible for collecting, interpreting, and evaluating factual information reflecting developmental and circumstantial factors for the assigned caseload of inmates. Served as the primary liaison with the U.S. Parole Commission in reporting the inmate's program progress, readiness or lack of readiness for release, and resources in the community relevant to the desirability of an inmate's release.
