If tools aren't sterile, if aftercare isn't followed, or if a patient's immune system is already compromised, the risk of infection increases.

For bigger surgeries, like facelifts or liposuction, the risk is naturally higher because incisions go deeper and take longer to heal.

Prevention Starts Before the Procedure

There's no question: the best way to deal with infection is to prevent it in the first place. That's something both patients and providers play a role in.


- Choose the right provider. This is step one. Always look for a board-certified physician
 or licensed medical professional. They know how to maintain a sterile environment and
 use safe, approved products.
- Sterile technique matters. Gloves, clean surfaces, sanitized equipment—none of this is optional. A quality practice has these safeguards built in.
- Prep properly. Patients should listen to pre-procedure instructions: stopping certain meds, avoiding alcohol, or treating skin conditions beforehand.
- Aftercare is key. Once the procedure is done, how you care for the treated area makes all the difference. Keep it clean, don't touch or scratch it, and follow every instruction your provider gives you.

Spotting Trouble Early



Not all redness or swelling means something is wrong—it's normal after most procedures. But there are warning signs that point to infection. If you see redness spreading, swelling that keeps getting worse, increasing pain, pus, or develop a fever, don't ignore it. Call your doctor right away. Acting fast can turn what could have been a big problem into a minor bump in the road.

How Infections Are Treated



Treatment depends on how bad it is:

- Mild cases might just need a round of oral antibiotics or a topical cream.
- Moderate cases could require the doctor to clean or drain the area.
- Severe cases—though rare—sometimes mean IV medications or even another procedure.


The bottom line: don't wait it out or try to self-treat. If you think something's wrong, get checked out.
