At the start of the IEP/classification process, there should be open lines of communication to set the tone for a constructive partnership. Creating open lines of communication involves more than attending the regularly scheduled meetings; it is more about creating a continuous dialogue that allows the exchange of ideas to enhance the child's educational goals. Parents know the child and understand the child's needs and behaviors. Meanwhile, educators and therapists bring professional experience and observations from the classroom that can provide a comprehensive view of the child's abilities.

Active participation in IEP meetings is another critical component. The IEP Meetings are not mere formalities but important moments where decisions are made that will impact the child's educational journey. Parents should feel comfortable asking questions, seeking clarification regarding educational jargon, and advocating for their child's needs. The IEP Meeting is a time for open dialogue, where the shared objective of supporting the child's development is emphasized.

Developing a collaborative approach throughout the IEP process can be the most challenging, but it will be the most rewarding for the child. Every member of the Child Study Team, including the parents, plays a crucial role in developing a plan that facilitates the child's educational growth. Effective communication is more than just an exchange of ideas and information; a relationship must be built with the case manager and Child Study Team from the district. As a parent, regular formal and informal check-ins with the case manager can foster a sense of relationship and support. In addition, achievement from the child should be celebrated, which can be seen as a tool to enhance motivation and morale among all Child Study Team members.

The journey of special education is complex and has many factors to include throughout the child's educational career. The partnership between parents and the Child Study Team is at the center of this journey. This partnership can flourish through open communication, active participation, and collaboration, providing each child with the specifically designed instruction they need to succeed.
